After four years at the top, Switzerland has come ahead of Singapore as the best place in the world to live and work, according to an HSBC global expat survey. Despite the dip, Singapore remains the best destination for families. HSBC Expat's annual table for the best places to live and work 2019, now in its 12th year, is designed to explore the relationships, opinions and experiences of people living across the puddle. Quality of life, highly competitive wages and stunning surroundings have seen Switzerland take first place for the first time, climbing from eighth place last year. Singapore is the only Asian city country ranked in the top three, and is even ahead of key international markets, including Australia, Germany and the UN. In the 2019 survey, the countries on the highest ranking were: Switzerland Singapore Canada Spain New Zealand Australia Turkey Germany United Arab Emirates Vietnam Countries were ranked according to criteria in 3 categories: Life (goodness and company), Aspiring (finance and ambition) and Small Suings (factors related to children). Switzerland tops Switzerland in the top 10 in the overall ranks, and has secured a place in the top 10 since 2011. An impressive 82% of expats in Switzerland improved their quality of life compared to their homeland, as its stunning landscape was an important contributing factor. The outcasts also praise Switzerland's low pollution levels, with 70% noticing a cleaner and more pleasant environment than they are used to at home. That's much higher than the global average with only 40% of all outcasts saying the same. Improved goodness doesn't stop there. Home of Geneva, City of Peace, Switzerland is known for its low crime rates and safe streets. Two-thirds (67%) outlawed there feel safer than in their homeland. Almost half (47%) young expats are moving abroad in order to continue career, and have very many swallowing prizes. V V (55%) more confident abroad, while more than seven out of 10 (71%) learn new skills. They also have a better chance of having a faster promotion or moving entirely to a new career path – with one in 10 even starting their own business after moving to the country. Moving abroad early can also be the key to unlocking higher wages. Four-fifths (80%) young people under the age of 35 increase their salary abroad. Expat Millennials can expect their income to jump by more than a third (35%), from the average global annual salary of \$40,000 to just under \$55,000. In comparison, for 35 to 54-year-olds, pay increases by just under a quarter (24%), while for over-55s it increases by 9%. With this increased profit, which in the short term means more disposable income, our data shows that millennials are also thinking in the long term. We have been told that home ownership is their priority, with 45% of under-35s already on the property ladder. Popular destinations for Millenials are Hong Kong, USA, UK and Poland.
